The technical name of the virus that causes COVID-19 is severe acute respiratory syndrome coronavirus 2, abbreviated as SARS-CoV-2.

Whilst the COVID-19 virus can cause serious illness, especially for vulnerable adults with underlying health conditions evidence suggests that for the majority (particularly children and young people) they will experience a mild to moderate illness.

Whilst this is a complex and changing situation, there is enough known about the epidemiology of COVID-19 to provide a risk-based approach to support staff in their roles.

DfE COVID-19 operational guidance for schools (February 2022) states that, 'COVID-19 continues to be a virus that we learn to live with and the imperative to reduce the disruption to children and young people's education remains. Our priority is to support you to deliver face-to-face, high-quality education to all pupils. The evidence is clear that being out of education causes significant harm to educational attainment, life chances and mental and physical health.'

The operational guidance explains the steps schools should take to manage COVID-19 in their school. This risk assessment is based on that guidance 'Schools COVID – 19 operational guidance' February 2022':

The assessment below has been developed based on the following principles:

- That we will act together to ensure the safety and reassurance of all staff, and children.
- It is necessary to remain alert and continue to recognise that all staff and pupils could be potentially carrying Covid-19.
- Application of 'Control measures' to individual school circumstances.

While COVID-19 still remains in the community, judgments need to be made at a school level about how to balance and minimise any risks from COVID-19 with providing a full educational experience for children.

Schools will also continue to have contingency plans outlining how they would operate if they need to take extra measures in exceptional circumstances. Given the detrimental impact that restrictions on education can have on children any measures in school will only ever be considered as a last resort, kept to the minimum number of groups possible, and for the shortest amount of time possible. Appendix 1: Clean hands protect against infection (WHO protocol)


Protect yourself

apply enough soap to cover all hand surfaces.



palm to palm with fingers interlaced




rotational rubbing, backwards and forwards with clasped fingers of right hand in left palm and vice versa.



use towel to turn off faucet




Rub hands paim to paim
